Medicaid Is the Health Care Safety Net for Children.

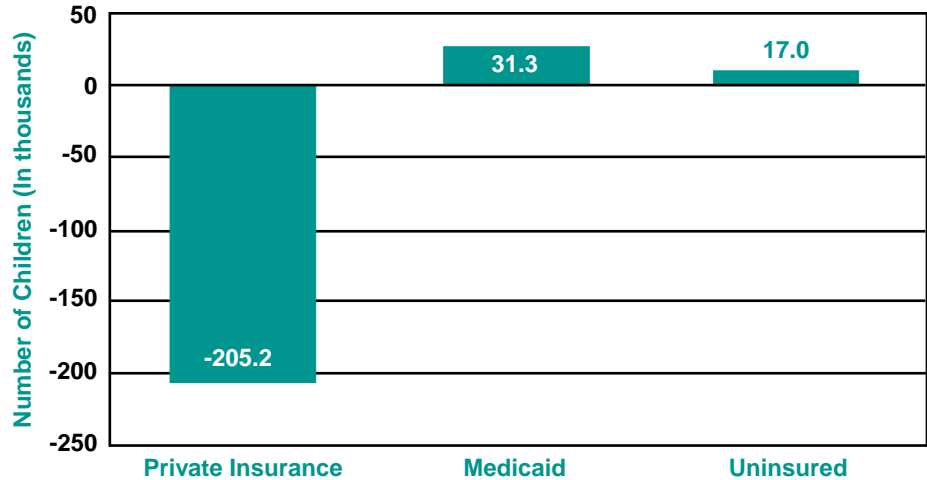
445,000 children under 21 in Missouri were covered by the Medicaid program in 1994.¹

In 1993, 39% of births in Missouri were paid for by Medicaid.

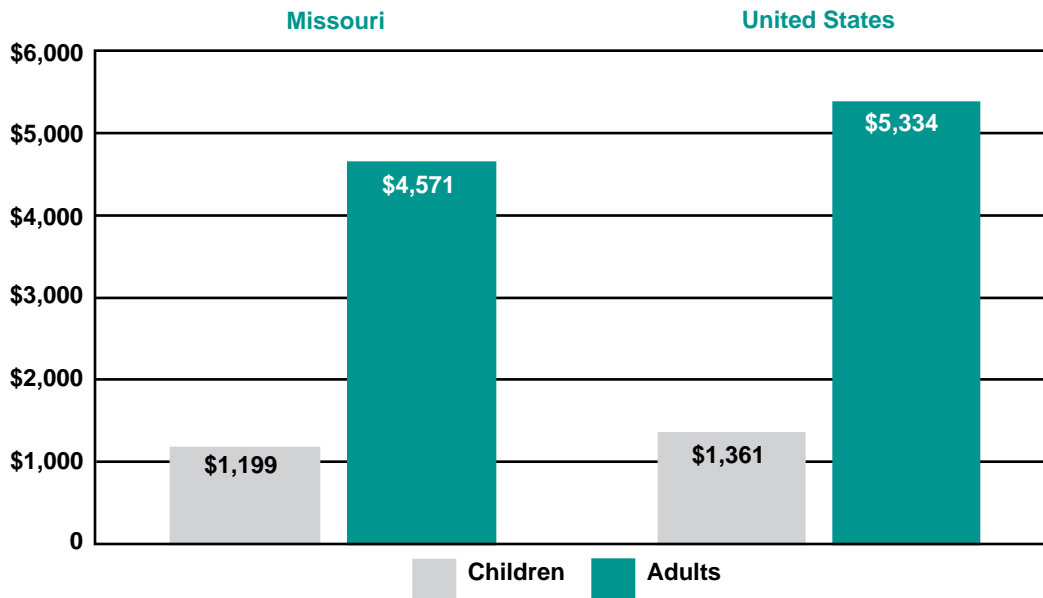
Medicaid Is Even More Important as Private Insurance Coverage Erodes.

Nationally, the majority of children receiving Medicaid live in a household where at least one parent works.²

Change in Health Care Coverage of Children Under 21 in Missouri from 1987 to 1993³

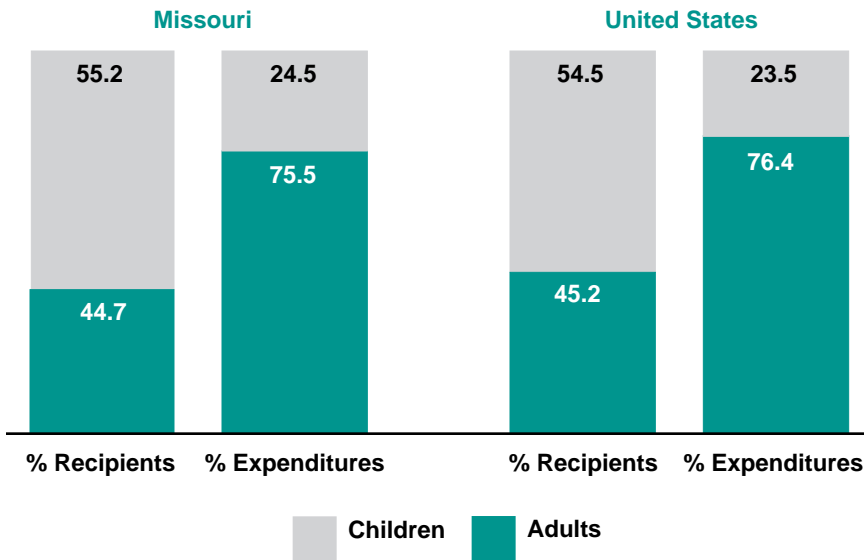


Average Annual Expenditure Per Medicaid Participant in 1994



Providing Health Care to Children Is Not Expensive. Providing health care to children costs a fraction of what it does for adults. In Missouri, Medicaid can insure three children for less than the cost of one adult.

While most Medicaid recipients are children, they account for one fourth of all Medicaid expenditures.

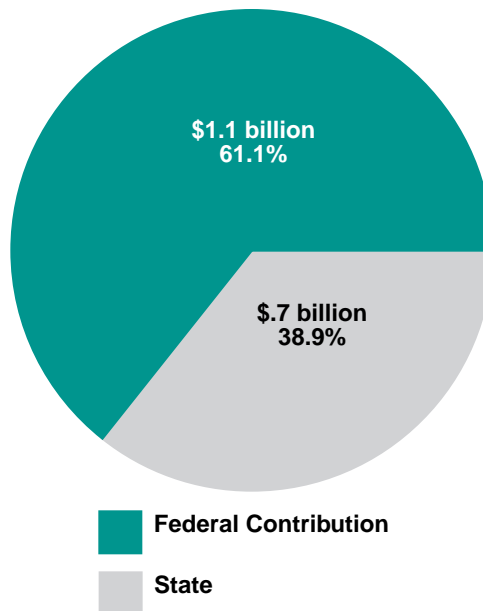
The average cost for Medicaid's preventive care program for children, Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnosis and Treatment (EPSDT), is \$253 a year in Missouri.

Funding Medicaid Is a State and Federal Partnership.

In Missouri over half of the Medicaid program is paid for by the federal government.

In 1994 Missouri received an additional \$578 million from the federal government in disproportionate share (DSH) payments for hospitals serving a high percentage of poor and uninsured patients.
