ABOUT THE PROGRAM

This is the sixteenth annual conference presented by the California Association of Neonatologists (CAN) and the AAP District IX Section on Perinatal Pediatrics. The meeting will include an optional workshop to help participants utilize CPQCC resources to improve perinatal outcomes. The conference and combined meeting will be dedicated to a scientific and practice-oriented discussion of current topics and controversies in perinatal and neonatal medicine.

The optional California Perinatal Quality Care Collaborative (CPQCC) workshop is geared to teams of caregivers from perinatal and neonatal units (neonatologists, obstetricians, nurses, infection control nurses, nutritionists, lactation consultants, respiratory therapists) who can effect change in the topics presented.

The optional Friday afternoon Neonatal CPT Coding Update Seminar is for neonatologists and neonatal billing personnel.

A workshop, "Life After Fellowship: Exploring Career Opportunities and Practical Considerations for New Neonatologists," will be offered on Friday. Participation is by invitation.

The Saturday and Sunday education program is directed to neonatologists and will provide an update on topics pertinent to current practice.

- Review the present status of CPQCC and PQIP projects

The California Perinatal Quality of Care Collaborative (CPQCC) invites all CPQCC NICUs to a 1-day symposium with a focus on **Best Practices in Selected Neonatal/Perinatal Care and Quality Improvement**.

AIM: Participants will hear summaries of changes made in the recently updated CPQCC toolkits (Antenatal Corticosteroid Therapy, Early-Onset Group B Streptococcus (GBS) Prevention, Nutritional Support of the VLBW Infant, Perinatal HIV Prevention, Postnatal Steroids Administration, & Improving Initial Lung Function: Surfactant and Other Means) as well as learn how to apply effective quality improvement methods to jump start local quality improvement initiatives using these toolkits. Participants will also learn of opportunities to satisfy the American Board of Pediatrics (ABP) recertification requirements using these CPQCC resources.

OBJECTIVES:

Following the lectures, discussions and group activities, participants will be able to:

1. Describe best practices in recently revised CPQCC Toolkits (i.e., Antenatal Corticosteroid Therapy, Early-Onset Group B Streptococcus (GBS) Prevention, Nutritional Support of the VLBW Infant, Perinatal HIV Prevention, Postnatal Steroids Administration, & Improving Initial Lung Function: Surfactant and Other Means)
2. Identify QI team process and practice issues that create positive patient impact
3. Describe how ABP MOC Part 4 quality improvement requirements can be met using CPQCC resources (i.e., Collaboratives, Toolkits, QI "Lite")
