 Presenter Responses to Questions and Answers

State	Questions Asked by Attendee	Response
PA	Q: This study is from 2004. Is there an updated study and do we think any of the results have changed as Medical Home becomes more widespread?	This received a response during the Webinar, but Dr Gillespie will also follow-up with additional information. In speaking with the director of the Child and Adolescent Health Measurement Initiative (the source of the data that I provided in the webinar), these particular items have not been repeated on a national scale. She stated that another national survey was definitely needed, but no updates exist at this point.
AZ	Q: Is there any work being doen with Child Protective services and foster parents to help address this need of consistency in maintaing a medical home, since they see and work with CEV	This received a response during the Webinar, but Dr Gillespie and AAP staff will also follow-up with additional information. Not much, as far as I can find, although one of the Webinar participants mentioned that North Carolina is currently working to link children in foster care with medical homes. It is definitely an area that needs further work. As I mentioned during the Webinar, there are measures around mental health follow up for children in DHS custody that may drive projects in this particular area in the future.
	Q: have you identified outcome indicators to access success?	This received a response during the Webinar.
NC	Q: In my state, we are making a concerted effort to get children in foster care assigned to a medical home.	That relates to the question above - thank you for the input!
CA	Q: Could you define "developmental promotion"?	This received a response during the Webinar. Just to reiterate - developmental promotion is the sum of the activities that help a child to grow and develop in a normal trajectory. Not a formal definition...but developmental promotion includes positive parenting practices, ways to enhance attachment and interactions between the parent and child, games / activities that parents can do with their child to stimulate brain development (reading / early literacy is the most obvious example), as well as appropriate discipline techniques.
MO	Q: This is more of a comment rather than a question, but for Medicaid patients many state departments of mental health have community support services that provide in-home mental health care that may also include a physical health component. This is true for my own state (Missouri) and we are implementing this in my cachement area in the Springfield area.	An excellent point - most of the state health divisions will have an Addictions and Mental Health section to provide these services.
